Our Learning Dispositions

Our school is a place where every student can explore new learning opportunities within and beyond the classroom. Skills in being self-critical and responding to feedback are learnt, strategies to recall and retrieve information as well as planning and revising work are the habits to achieve reflectiveness.

Resourcefulness

Resourcefulness is developing in students the ability to know what to do when they don't know what to do. Being able to find and make use of multiple resources, reasoning, thinking and questioning as well as learning to seek connections across the curriculum and to the real world are the habits to develop resourcefulness.

Responsibility

Responsibility is developing the understanding in students that they are accountable for their actions toward themselves, others and their environment. Students develop the capacity to be open minded, to look for good reasons and sound evidence to make fair decisions.

Reciprocity

Reciprocity encompasses the social aspect of learning. Students develop skills to connect socially with others for mutually beneficial learning. Skills in being able to learn with and from others in multiple ways and empathy are the habits developed to learn reciprocity.

With this focus on developing the whole learner we truly believe that Oak Flats High School is your place to learn and grow.

Roll Call

Roll call begins after period 1 each day. The roll call groups are organised by year, alphabetically, with approximately 25 students in each (e.g. 7.1, 7.2, 7.3). You will be allocated a roll call room and teacher.

During roll call you will:

- have your name marked for attendance,
- hand in any absentee notes,
- have daily roll notices read (which provide information about activities happening in the school),
- have your uniform checked to ensure it meets the school uniform policy.

How Year 7 Classes will be Organised ?

Interested students have applied for positions in the Motivated Learners Class 2025 and have received letters concerning placements. The other classes will be decided by the Transition Team, consisting of the Year 7 Deputy Principal, Year Adviser, Transition Officer and Learning Support Teacher, in collaboration with your Year 6 teachers.

In order to ensure every student is known, valued and cared for, we operate a Homeroom Program in Year 7. This structure sees each Year 7 class allocated one teacher who teaches the class for two or three subjects. The subjects vary from class to class depending on the skill set of the teacher. This allows our Homeroom teachers to get to know their students both from a wellbeing perspective, as well as how they learn, ensuring we are able to provide the best possible support to students during their first year of high school.

Students have been placed in one of the following classes by the Transition Team in consultation with our partner primary schools. The class letters create one of our key values, the world LEARN.

Homeroom and teachers will be:



Enrichment opportunities in 2025 are the Motivated Learners Class and Year 7 Enrichment Electives. Enrichment Electives are designed to give students opportunity to study subjects of particular interest and develop or extend their abilities in these areas. Enrichment Electives include: All Codes (Sports), Agriculture, Music, STEM.

School Uniform

"The wearing of school uniform depicts pride in the school."

The wearing of uniform applies during school hours, while travelling to and from school, and when students are on school excursions (unless otherwise stated in the excursion information). Our uniforms are supplied by Lowes Shellharbour.

Students have a range of formal and informal uniform options and may choose any combination of the options listed below.

Standard Items

- Green/black/white polo top with logo on left side (Years 7-9)
- White polo with logo on left side (Years 10-12)
- White button-through blouse with logo on left side
- White button through shirt with logo on left pocket
- School tie (optional)
- Oak Flats tartan dress with white collar, tie and sleeve cuff
- Oak Flats tartan pleated shirt
- Black stretch shorts with one zip pocket available in two lengths
- Black tailored shorts
- Black or white plain socks

Additional items for cooler days

- Black track pants with OFHS initials
- Black tailored pants
- Black stockings (with dress or skirt)
- Black shell jacket with zip front and logo on left side
- Black fleecy jacket with green stripe cuff and bottom band, front pockets, zip front and logo on left side
- Black blazer with logo on left pocket
- Year 11 and Year 12 official senior jersey/jacket for that year group
- Note: Students without an official school jacket may wear a plain black jacket/jumper and plain black track pants with no markings at all, and will not be considered to be out of uniform. No hoodies.

Sport Uniform

Sport shirt – polo top with sublimated logo in green and white Black sports shorts with OFHS initials

Shoes

Black enclosed shoes must be worn for safety reasons. Students without appropriate footwear may be excluded from practical lessons in all courses.

Hats

Students are encouraged to wear a cap/hat when outdoors for sun protection. Students may also wish to wear a beanie in the winter.

Any headwear must not have offensive words/slogans or drug references.

All headwear must be removed when inside school buildings.



Why is a school uniform worn?

Students are required to wear uniform because it provides:

- identification with Oak Flats High School
- a sense of pride in belonging to Oak Flats High School
- security, as any strangers are immediately identifiable by staff
- equity, as the dress is the same for all students
- a safe and appropriate standard of dress for a range of school activities
- an economical way for families to dress their children and as a requirement of the Occupational Health and Safety Act 2000



Items Not Allowed at School

Students are not allowed to have the following items at school:

- Mobile phones and devices are expected to be turned off and in student's bags for the entire school day, school gate to school gate.
- Aerosol cans e.g. deodorant etc
- Sharps or dangerous objects e.g.: knives etc
- Cigarettes, lighters, matches and Vapes
- Laser pointers
- Inappropriate literature or reading material
- Illicit drugs
- Water bombs
- Chewing gum
- Skateboards/ scooters to be stored in bike compound upon arrival at school
- Liquid paper, Textas, paint pens and permanent markers
- Energy drinks

Students found in possession of the above items will have them confiscated and will be managed through the school disciplinary systems.

Mobile phones and devices that are confiscated for the second and subsequent times in the week will need to be collected and signed out by a parent. No notes will be accepted.

We also encourage students not to bring excessive amounts of money or valuable possessions to school.

The school accepts no liability for any personal property brought to school by any student in the event of loss, theft or damage.

Bikes, Scooters & Skateboards

Can be brought to school at the owner's risk. These items MUST be kept only in the Bike Compound during school hours. It is highly recommended that students supply a locking/security device. These items are not to be ridden anywhere in school grounds. The school accepts no liability for loss or damage. Helmets must be worn as required by law.

School Awards/Levels System

Oak Flats High School is strongly committed to a policy of encouraging and rewarding achievement in all aspects of school life. Students who achieve success, show improvement, work consistently and who demonstrate excellent behaviour are recognised and rewarded.

Aspire Assemblies

Student pogress is recognised with a formal Aspire assembly at the end of Terms 1, 2 and 3. At the end of the year, our Aspire Achieve Succeed Awards Evening is held to recognise excellence in academic achievement, attendance, sport, the arts, school and community service.

Students receive a letter of invitation for themselves and family members to attend assemblies in the Hall. The assemblies are for recipients only with guest speakers and musical items.

Behaviour Expectations

Oak Flats High School is first and foremost a place of learning where students are encouraged to aspire, achieve and succeed. The following behaviour expectations allow all students the opportunity to learn and grow.



Monitoring Student Behaviour

To monitor student performance and behaviour at school, Oak Flats High School has a wellbeing system database. If your teachers believe you are not performing in class, not behaving appropriately or having problems, you will have your name entered on this database. A group of staff meet weekly to look over which students have been entered on the program. If your name appears a number of times you will be asked to attend an interview to discuss the situation, possibly with your parents. If it continues, you may be placed on a Monitoring Card. A monitoring card requires you to have your teacher's rate and comment on your behaviour in each lesson.

If improvements are not seen, further action will be taken, in line with the school discipline system.

People Who Can Help You

Whilst all school staff care for students wellbeing, certain specialist staff make up our school wellbeing team whose responsibility is student wellbeing. This team is led by our Head Teacher Wellbeing and includes all Year Advisers, Deputy Principals, Student Support Officer, Attendance Officer, Supervisor of Girls and our School Counsellors.

Similarly, all school staff share responsibility for student learning, however, specialist staff make up our school Learning Support Team who are dedicated to support student learning. This team is led by our Head Teacher Teaching and Learning and includes all Learning and Support Teachers, School Learning and Support Officers, Deputy Principals, Attendance Officer and School Counsellors.

Inclusion and Support Team

Another source of assistance for students and parents/carers is the Inclusion and Support Team. These staff are available to assist with specific or generalised concerns. The team meets once a week throughout term with the purpose of providing wholistic, wrap-around support to ensure student's wellbeing for learning. The team receive student referrals from staff, parents/carers and students themselves across all domains including, but not limited to issues such as attendance, learning and wellbeing needs, health care concerns and student engagement. Each referral is unique and the team works collaboratively to ensure we support the whole child. Supports may be enacted across all areas within the team and can be a mix of short and longer-term supports as appropriate to the identified student needs.

Other Useful Information

Emergency Evacuations

In the event of an emergency or evacuation a continuous bell rings until the emergency is over. Students should leave the building calmly under the direction of teachers and assemble in their roll call class on the Brett Lee oval. Students are to remain at the emergency assembly point with the teachers where your class roll will be marked by your roll teacher and you await further instructions.

These evacuation drills and lockdown procedures will be explained in further detail during orientation days and early in Term 1, 2025.

Students will be placed into houses according to their surname/siblings.





Toilets

Boys and Girls toilets are located off West Quad, either side of the canteen to be used before and after school and during first and second breaks. As a general rule, students are not permitted to go to the toilet during lesson time. If you need to visit the toilets during a lesson, you will need to negotiate this with your teacher, and go to the front administration office to use the toilet facilities located there. The toilets are not a place for socialising.

Payment of Money for Excursions/Fees

Money to be paid for excursions, sport, fees etc. is to be paid to the front office before school or at first break. Parents can also pay via our School Bytes payment portal, details can be found on our school's website. You will be given a receipt for your payment. Keep this as you may need to show a teacher.

School Canteen

The school canteen is open daily for breakfast before school, at both breaks and accepts cash or Eftpos. Please ensure students have a debit card as they will not be able to pay using a mobile phone. A variety of tasty and nutritious foods including fresh sandwiches, rolls, salads, burgers, pasta, drinks snacks and more are available to purchase at each break on a first-come first-serve basis. For convenience, items can be pre-ordered either on-line or directly at the canteen by 9am and these will be made to order and ready for an express pick up.

Out of Bound Areas

In the playground, there are some areas that are "Out of Bounds". For your safety you are not to be in these areas at any time during the school day. These areas are indicated with yellow lines painted on the ground around the school. For example, the car park.



Vaccinations

All Year 7 students will be offered Human Papillomavirus, Diphtheria, Tetanus, Pertussis, Hepatitis B and Chicken Pox vaccines in early 2025.

School Attendance, Student Absence & the Law

Under the Education Act 1990 (Section 22) and the Education Amendment Act 2009 (No. 25), parents have a legal responsibility to ensure the regular school attendance of their children aged between 6 and 17 years.

The school day starts at 8:30am. It is each student's responsibility to move to their first period room promptly when the bell rings in the morning, and ensure that their teacher marks them as being at school.

Whole Day Absence from School

Students should attend school every day, unless:

- The child is too sick to leave the house.
- The child has an infectious disease.
- The child is incapacitated by injury which would prevent movement around the school.
- The child has to honour a religious commitment.
- The child is accompanying the parent and no alternative arrangements can be made.

Lateness to School

Students arriving at school should go directly to the Student Administration Office. Late students MUST provide a note from home explaining the reason for their lateness. The student's lateness will be recorded on the school roll as a Partial Absence on that day. Where no note is supplied for lateness to school the absence will be marked as being 'unexplained'.

Supplying SMS or Notes for Absences

If a student is absent a text message will be sent to their parent or carer via Sentral. Please reply to the message ASAP stating the reason your child is absent.

Students who are absent from school, need to supply a note or email within 7 days explaining their absence. Failure to do so will result in the absence being marked as being 'unexplained'. The note or email should include:

-The student's name (both given and surname)

- -Year and Roll Class
- -Date/s of absence/s
- -Signature of parent/guardian

Where notes come in with no reason, the absence will remain 'unexplained'. To avoid this occurring, an adequate reason needs to appear on the note. Absentee Booklets are available from the front office.

In weeks 4 and 8 of each term Attendance Update letters are emailed out to parents and carers to help them monitor their child's school attendance.

Leave Passes

Students who need to leave school during the day (a PARTIAL ABSENCE), need to follow the following procedures:

- Note has to be signed by a Deputy
- Students must report to D-Block Administration Office, before school, to obtain a leave pass.
- Students must have a note requesting a leave Pass.
- The note must contain the students full name, year and roll class, date of absence, reason
- For absence, time of departure and return to school and parent/guardian signature.
- An official leave Pass will be issued.

In the event where you are required to pick up a student for a Partial Absence and no note has been provided (i.e. in the case of an emergency), please do not take the student without notifying the school. Students are to be picked up and signed out from the front office. A note can be signed here and an Official Leave Pass will be issued by the office staff. Parents and carers must call the school office to arrange collection of their child. Please do not contact your child directly.

Sick at School

If you are sick at school:

- Let your classroom teacher know.
- They will supply you with a note to go to the Administration block to see the First Aid Officer.
- If your parents are required the Administration staff will contact them.

Please do not contact your parents via your personal mobile phone.

Student Requirements for class

Parent Information

Starting Year 7 – Advice for Parents

Following is advice provided by the Department of Education on starting your child at High School. More details can also be found on the internet by going to www.schools.nsw.edu.au

Going to high school will be a new experience for your child. The school is likely to be much bigger than the primary school and your child may feel lost and insecure at first. Instead of being a senior in a small school, they are now a beginner in a big school. From day one, there will be many changes students need to get accustomed to, including having a number of different teachers and different classrooms, often spread across a larger campus. Set class periods on particular subjects may also be of a longer duration than in primary school. They will be required to carry around notes, books and devices from class to class.

New Teachers

In high school, students may have eight or more subject teachers, plus a year adviser to provide help and support. It's common for new Year 7 students to feel concerned that their needs and interests might get lost in the crowd. It is important to let them know that there are always people available to help them and that they should not hesitate to ask questions.

New Subjects

In Year 7 students will be introduced to subjects they haven't experienced before, and other subjects may have a different approach and emphasis from primary school learning. They will also be expected to be more independent and self-reliant, than in primary school.

The Timetable

Timetables are based on a 'two week cycle', with the lessons in Week A being different from those in Week B. It's a good idea for your child to check their timetable when they get home every evening so they can be sure to pack their bag with everything they'll need for the next day – such as books, devices, writing materials, PE uniform and sporting equipment. Being prepared for the next school day cuts down on stress for both you and your child, especially when they're settling in. Try to spend some time each night in the first few weeks of school talking with them about school and going through their timetable with them, in preparation for the next day of work. If you drop off/pick up your child from school, it is recommended to use the Bus Bay site to avoid traffic congestion.

Your Child's Progress

Reports play a vital role in telling you how your child is going at school. Student reports will be sent home to you at least twice a year, usually at the end of Terms 2 and 4, to give you a clear understanding of your child's progress. Both the Principal and teachers will be more than happy to discuss your child's progress with you. Many high schools hold parent/teacher meetings to provide parents with the opportunity to discuss their child's progress with all of their child's teachers. Other high schools have an ongoing 'open door policy', and encourage parents to visit or telephone the school if they wish to discuss any concerns or ideas they may have.

Keeping in Touch with School Activities

Oak Flats High School will regularly update our website, School Bytes, Sentral Parent Portal, Facebook and instagram with newsletters, notes and invitations to school functions and parent meetings. Most of this information will be given to your child, with the expectation that they take it home to you.

Getting Involved

Our school always welcomes parent involvement and support. Parent groups like the P&C Association provide a great opportunity to become involved in the life of the school and to participate in school decision making. Our P&C meets on a Wednesday once a term. Meetings begin at 6.30pm either in the School Administration building or in the Bistro at Oak Flats Bowling Club. New members are welcome. Volunteering at school events and fundraisers can be a great way to meet other parents and school staff. Any help that you are able to offer will be appreciated.

Parents: 10 Tips to Help Prepare Students for High School

Entering high school is an exciting time for students. They are moving into what is often a larger school environment. This can lead to anxiety or periods of unease. Here are some steps parents and caregivers can take to help students start high school on a positive note.

1. Be interested and enthusiastic about their move to high school.

Your encouragement will help your child to make a successful transition to High School. Listen to their experiences and expectations.

2. School Participation

Always keep a look out for events at your child's school which may help him/her learn about what high school is like. Become involved in the School Parents and Citizens Group, as it provides vital input for parents to the schools organisation and programs.

3. Make sure travel arrangements to and from school are organised

Organise travel passes. This will help settle some of the concern about independent travel. Talk about back-up travel arrangements, for example, what to do if a bus or train doesn't come.

4. Discuss the changes every student will experience.

Emphasise that many people feel apprehensive about changing from a small primary school to a larger high school, and that there will be people to help them adjust.

5. Organise your child's uniform well before the first day of school.

Having the new uniform will help your child start to feel a sense of belonging to the school.

6. Learn about school routines and timetables.

Talking to students already enrolled at the school can be useful in finding out information about things such as sporting venues used by the school and school finishing times. The school will provide information before it's needed. Information about the school can also be accessed on the school website:http://www.oakflats-h.schools.nsw.edu.au/

7. Help your child to develop good study habits.

Try to provide them with somewhere private and quiet to study. Help your child to set aside a particular time to study. Work out a daily timetable that incorporates all your child's needs and interests. Regularly viewed TV programs, club activities and sport should all be part of the timetable. Ultimately they will need to manage their own study and they can guide you in what is helpful for them.

8. Practise organisational skills.

In the first few weeks of high school you might want to check with your child that they have the right books for the following day. You will quickly encourage a good habit.

9. Discuss emergency and safety issues.

Talk about these issues - including crossing roads or taking essential medication - simply and without emotion. Allow your child to contribute their views. Find out who the staff are at the school that can help them if they need it on issues such as medication.

10. Let your child know that you trust them and that they can trust you.

Keep communication open about all your child's experiences, and make sure they know you're available if things go wrong.

How to Help your Children with Homework and Study

Homework

Your child will generally have homework set and as they move into more senior years the homework and study demands will increase. Homework reinforces work done in class and helps develop skills such as research and time management. It also helps to establish the habits of study, concentration and self-discipline.

You can help your child by:

- taking an active interest in their homework.
- supporting them in setting aside time for homework.
- providing a dedicated place for homework and study if possible.
- assisting teachers to monitor homework by signing completed homework if requested, and be aware of the amount of homework set.
- communicating any concerns to teachers about the nature of homework or your child's approach to homework.
- encouraging your child to read and take an interest in current events.
- alerting the school to any domestic circumstances or extra-curricular activities which may need to be taken into consideration when homework is being set or marked.

- try to keep noise and distractions to a minimum. If possible, turn off the TV.
- encourage other family members to support these students where possible, Eg. older brothers and sisters can help with homework, going to the library, etc.
- other good places to study are libraries, After School Study Centres, etc.

Students can also access the Homework Centre, which takes place each Wednesday after school in the Information Centre.
